Court gives deadline for response

Macon County officials are given until Monday to respond to Tyson's appeal to raid casino

The Alabama Supreme Court has given several Macon County officials until Monday afternoon to respond to the latest attempt by Gov. Bob Riley's gambling task force to get permission to raid Alabama's largest casino.

said Friday the Supreme Court appears to be taking his latest plea seriously for permission to raid the VictoryLand casino at Shorter, which has more than 6,000 electronic bingo machines

An attorney for VictoryLand, Mark White of Birmingham, said casino officials and lawyers will spend the weekend weighing their options on what to do next, since it appears Tyson will eventually gain permission to raid the casino.

County officials referred to Riley as a "lame duck governor" with a "lame duck task force" and said he was running out of time in his efforts to shut down electronic bingo

Tyson filed an emergency appeal Thursday night asking the Supreme Court to overturn an injunction by Young that has blocked a raid since March

The Supreme Court informed attorneys in the case Friday that they have until 4 p.m. Monday to respond to Tyson's filing.

The latest round of action in Alaba-

ma's bingo battle came as a result of a lawsuit by Macon County District At-torney E. Paul Jones, Sheriff David Warren and other Macon officials saying Tyson should not be allowed to raid the casino without the permission of local officials. Young agreed with the local officials and had blocked a raid.

Last week the Supreme Court sided with Tyson, but court rules gave the local officials 18 days to file a request with the justices for reconsideration. Tyson asked Young for permission to go ahead and raid, but the judge refused, prompting Tyson's appeal to the Supreme Court.

Montgomery's police chief soon will be overseeing federal law enforcement efforts in 23 Alabama counties.

Arthur Baylor received the unanimous approval of the U.S. Senate on Thursday night to become the new U.S. marshal for the Middle District of Alabama.

Baylor was on vacation at the time of the announcement and had not received official notification Friday. In a statement made through Capt. Keith Barnett, a police spokesman, Baylor said the move was "bittersweet" because he would be leaving the Montgomery Police Department after 27 years of service.

President Barack Obama nominated Baylor to the position in April.

U.S. Rep. Bobby Bright recommended Baylor as U.S. marshal. In 2004, when Bright was mayor of Mont-

Woman to become Ala. Air National Guard's first female fighter pilot

Pilot Sara Ferrero is flying almost every day and is nearing her destination — becoming the Alabama Air National Guard's first female fighter pilot.

Taking to the skies is some thing she always wanted to do, but it wasn't until she was 20 and attending the University of Central Florida in Orlando that she realized she really could

Now she's about halfway through her undergraduate pilot training at Columbus Air Force Base in Mississippi. She'll be 28 at the end of the month. She's got two more training courses to complete after that.

Next fall, she'll be back in Alabama flying one of the F-16 Fighting Falcons with the 100th Fighter Squadron of the 187th Fighter Wing at Dannelly Field.
