Glassy mulch may be a keeper

Entrepreneur just needs cash to put recycle idea to work

Jeff Lapidus is bullish on glass.

The Huntsville entrepreneur is working to raise \$3 million to turn an abandoned brick factory near the Tennessee River into one of Alabama's first glass recycling businesses.

Lapidus, whose family owns Richards Lighting on University Drive, wants to convert old beer bottles, mayonnaise jars and even discarded windshields into glass mulch and other Earthfriendly products.

Glass mulch has been used in landscapes out West for years but hasn't yet caught on in Alabama.

Lapidus hopes to change that. Last week, he spread several hundred pounds of the stuff at Huntsville Botanical Garden and Lincoln Mill on Meridian Street as a demonstration.

The glass is pulverized into small pieces and then tumbled until its sharp edges are smooth.

While it's fun to look at,

It's weekend wait for county arrests

Paying bond can be big problem with absent magistrate

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On a recent Friday afternoon, a man was arrested by Madison County authorities for failing to appear in court for fishing without a license. His bond would eventually be set at just \$42, but because it was Friday, and Monday happened to be a holiday, the man ended up staying in jail for more than three days, according to a Madison County jail employee.
